What is a Director?

- A director is the creative lead of a production. This individual holds the creative vision throughout the entire film production process.
- A director is heavily involved in all stages of filmmaking such as the development, pre-production, production, post-production phases.







What is a Director?

- A director is responsible for giving their personal vision to the script of a production, and therefore impacts how the story is told. A director will evolve from a literary script to a technical one, specifying the shots to be filmed within the production.
- A director is responsible for selecting locations, actors, camera layout, the set, the props and the costumes. Therefore, as an individual in this role it is important to guide others during the creation process.






















What characteristics are important as a director?

As a director, you will need to be:

- **1. Disciplined and orderly:** with the ability to make decisions and delegate wisely. So that all teams are properly coordinated.
- 2. Multifaceted: You must have knowledge of different areas since you work with varied professional profiles within all phases of the film creation process.
- **3. Sacrificed:** willing to invest a lot of time and effort. Your involvement in the projects will be very high.
- **4. Creative:** With a single script, thousands of different films could be developed. Your personal and unique vision will give a personal feature to the work.
- **5. Patient:** throughout the creation process, You will work with many different teams with diverse professional profiles.







Stages of Direction:



Pre-Production Phase

Production Phase

Post-Production Phase

There are three phases included in the direction of a production. Each phase requires a director to undertake different actions. This allows directors to gain an input into all aspects of a production.





The Pre-Production Phase

In the pre-production phase, a director is responsible for transforming the *literary* script into a *technical* script. This means that a director will scout locations for the set alongside the director of photography and the assistant director.

Alongside the producer, in this phase the director will make decisions regarding the budget.
 Additionally, the director will communicate and rehearse with actors that will feature in the production.











Making Changes to the Script

•Gauging if the script needs rewrites or revisions

Working with Department Heads

•The entire crew must be on the same vision for the production

Storyboarding and Shot listing

 This helps team members to gain information on camera short framing, camera angles and camera movement

Auditioning and Casting Actors

 The director and produce will look for people who stand out during their casting call.

Preparing for the Shoot

 The director and producer will work together to make sure that they have the necessary resources and equipment to begin shooting









The Production Phase - On Set Even though directors are behind the camera, they do more

Even though directors are behind the camera, they do more than shout "action" and "cut" in the production process.

In the production phase, the director must decide where the camera should focus for each scene. The 'staging' and work of the actors needs to be considered for each shot. A director works with the camera crew and the sound technicians to ensure that the scenes are properly coordinated.

The director is responsible for visualising the script and guiding others on set.











Roles of a Director in the Production Phase

Discover how actors will work

This will be adjusted accordingly to bring out the best performance

Guide Actors and Crew

•Directing actors and crew what to do to ensure that the production runs smoothly

Staging the Camera

•Discovering how the shots will be filmed

Control the Dramatic and Artistic Aspects

•Ensure that the vision of the production is being translated on screen

Communicate with all department heads

 Checking that all individuals involved in the production are on track









The Post-Production Phase

- During the post-production phase, the director works with the film editors to tell the story in the best possible way. Often, this means that many versions of a scene will be edited multiple times. Once the first "cut" of a film is complete, it is produced as the *Director's Cut*.
- A director will supervise and work alongside musicians, colourists, special effects teams to create the final product. Moreover, directors will closely work with the producer before the Final Cut is complete.
- This phase can typically take between weeks and months to complete. Directors will need to focus on the rules of editing, transitions, pacing and rhythm of the final cut.









Roles of a Director in the Post-Production Phase

Give Notes to the Edito

•Review and check editor's notes by breaking down footage, shots and angles.

Check-in with the Sound Department

 Sound design is created and mixed with the director providing feedback

Work with the Visual Effects Department

 Collaborate with the sound and visual effects teams to ensure that all decisions made are in line with your vision

Communicate with composers

 To incorporate original scores or soundtracks for the Final Cut

Work closely with the Producer

•To corroborate all ideas to produce the Director's Cut and Final Cut









A Day in the Life of a Director
















Learning Activity 1: Your Vision






What is a storyboard?

A storyboard is a graphic layout that sequences illustrations with the purpose of telling a story. This is commonly used in the production phase so that directors can gain a visual of how they want their scenes to appear. A storyboard can help you to visualise how your production will appear when it is filmed.

Example: Storyboards by David Lowery for Steven Spielberg's *Jurassic Park*

- ☐ Camera angles (close-ups, wide shots, etc.)
- Emotions
- ☐ Story
- ☐ Time Frame
- Dialogue










Case Study: Silvia Sandra Martini - Director and Producer



Her Story

Silvia Sandra Martini is a Spanish film director and producer. She began her career in 2017. She was a finalise in a film festival in Australia and that encouraged her to continue with her career in this field. Later she began making her own short films. Among many courses, she studied audiovisuals and specialised in film directing at the University of Málaga.

Her Challenges


Martini found that she had to work harder than what is expected of men in her profession. She experienced sexism both in her education and professional life. However, she didn't let this hold her back. She knew the importance of facing the prejudices of having a family as a woman and wanting to have a career too.







Case Study: Silvia Sandra Martini - Director and Producer



Overcoming Obstacles

Martini did not set limits for herself. She knew what path she wanted to take and did not set limits for herself. By believing in herself, and knew to believe in her confidence in her profession.

Advice from Silvia

- Try and get a good educational training. Martini studied many courses in how to be behind the camera but also in front of it too.
- Set a goal where you want to go without listening to the little voices that you sometimes hear along the way . Such as "you can't", "this is too difficult". Ignore the voices. Keep going and succeed.
- Work hard and achieve it! It won't be easy, but it will be worth it.


Martini mentions the sexism she faced in her professional life and education. Have you experienced this in your life? When?

Strategies to enter the Screenwriting profession:

Learn the Basics

- If a career as a director is something you want to pursue, learning film history and theory can help you to get the knack of this career.
- Learn more about the styles, equiment, lingo and strategies used by directors!

Join a Film Crew

- Work experience in the film industry can set you on the path to success. Why not join a film crew to gain relevant experience.
- Why not try any opportunity to join a film crew, even if it is not a directing role.

Write, Shoot, Repeat

- No matter how much you know about films, you need to put theory into practice.
- The more you practice writing, shooting and editing films the better you can enhance your skills for this role.









Strategies to enter the Screenwriting profession:

Build a Director's Reel

- A great way to enter the industry is through a portfolio.
 Similarly, as a director you will need to develop a Director's Reel.
- This will act as a visual portfolio to show your skill to others.

Enhance Your People Skills

- As a director, you will need to manage a whole crew.
 Therefore, people skills are a necessity.
- As a director, you will need to be a good leader who cares for your team and values their input.

Submit to Film Festivals

- Submitting your directed works to film festivals can be a great way to immerse yourself in the film sector.
- This can help you to build confidence, gain experience and network with other individuals who also want to pursue directing craeers.









Opportunities of being a Screenwriter

The Gender Imbalance in the Screenwriting Industry - Did you know?

Across the EU, only 23% of directors are women.

It was recorded in 2019, that women directed just 4% of the top films from the past decade.






In 2021, globally only 12% of women were directors.







Across the film industry, only 1 in 10 directors are women.




Learning Activity 2: Storyboard your Shots

Step 3: From your mind map brainstorm, imagine how you will depict your shots in your storyboard.














